Judges report Orpington Southern Feature Shepparton 6th July 2019

Firstly, I would like to extend to the OC of Australia to invitation to judge the Southern Feature.

In total app. 110 Orpingtons were appraised by me. I thoroughly enjoyed the experience and after many years breeding and exhibiting Wyandottes the move to Orpingtons has been a worthwhile and enjoyable experience.

I especially have enjoyed the comradery of the Orpington breeders and their appreciation of good competition amongst their own without the hustle and bustle of a win at all cost attitude. This is a delightful experience not often met with these days and the nature of the breeders and exhibitors lends itself to a hassle free and enjoyable experience from the other end of the judging stick.

The exhibits I handled were a credit to their owners and each one was superbly fit and turned out for the day. In my considered opinion the Orpington breed is a stable in a world of uncertainty, and the breeders again deserve congratulations for maintaining a level of quality in this soft feather breed that is perhaps not found in other breeds.

STANDARDS

Black: This was a strong section and many good birds were present. The winning cock was a superb bird, deep, round and with the correct back line. He was well moulded and had a typical Orpington skull and comb. The hen class was of good quality, and the winning hen was an Orpington of some quality. The cockerel class was a very close one and not much separated the three carded birds and perhaps 2 other exhibits in this section. The first placed bird went on to ne champion Black Orpington and he was superbly turned out on the day. He has wonderful width, stance and a tight underline, possessed wonderful symmetry and moulding as a fowl. He was closely pressed by the second placed cockerel and in the end I felt the winner had a better head and comb by the merest of margins, although a double secretion in the second placed cockerel separated the cards at the end of section. There was also a cockerel unplaced that was a superb bird but his wing feathers were too short, and it appeared if they had been pulled at some stage and were re-growing. This spoilt his chances and in a few months time he would give any of the card places a real run for their money. Pullets were excellent, deep, broad and well moulded. The females were a little fluffy in their underlines and perhaps could have more leg underneath them if the strictest adherence to the standard was applied. The winning pullet and her carded companions were excellent in all other quarters and had terrific heads, eyes, feet and other Orpington characteristics. In this class was also an uncarded female, perhaps on the small side, but very tight in feather and possessing an excellent Orpington type. Again there was an unpacked female of superb Orpington type but just too small to fully meet the standards and the required weights.

Buff: This was a large section and although the type did vary to some degree the variation in colour was very evident. The winning cockerel was a superb specimen, big, upright and bold in his condition and his top colour was excellent, his colour was even and carried all the way to the skin. He was an easy winner in this class. The pullets were a quality class although unevenness of colour and distribution of colour, even within the same bird was evident. The three placed birds were excellent for type, colour, evenness and technically more correct in their buff colour.

Blues: I enjoyed this class and the four sections were characterised by having excellent specimens of the breed and colour in each of them. The winning cockerel was very solid bird, robust in constitution and good

colour. The winning pullets likewise was sound in all quarters. She had a correct back line and that short, concave shape one should look for when evaluating the Orpington.

In this section was a cockerel which I placed second and he was a very impressive bird. He was tight in feathering, carried his top and under line superbly, but his lack of maturity held him back. I really would like to see this male as a cock bird and I am sure he will continue to carry the impressive features he possessed on this day. He is a quality bird with many attributes that together make for an outstanding Orpington. With some growing under his belt he will make for a bird of excellent type, breed characteristics and the correct top and under lines.

Splash: Some excellent birds here. The winning pullets and cockerel were as described, free from rust or gold and of good type. The pale blue ground colour was evident in all the exhibits in this section.

White; whites were few in number but were of good type and colour. Whilst they lag a little behind their black and blue counterparts they have tremendous potential to be a most impressive variety.

Bantams

Were few in number but I chose a black hen as my eventual winner, a sweet headed bird, very sound in colour and type. The winning male was also a good Orpington, lustrous green sheen and of good type.

Juniors

A fair show of some good birds and a black male was chosen as best in this section, of good type, character and an excellent head.

Noted points in need of attention.

It was not good to see that very few exhibits had enamelled lobe, and when this was met with it was in the bantams. Good eye colour was noted in all the birds, as were some excellent cut combs. Double serrations were evident and this needs to be watched out for. Double serrations or fish tailed spikes spoil an otherwise excellent exhibit and although of minor concern they should be guarded against.

Type was excellent throughout the show and no exhibit could be deemed as lacking breed characteristics. This is a tremendous accolade for the breeders who have maintained their birds without changing the characteristics of style, body shape or heads and that are so important for defining a breed as different to all others. The birds I handled were of excellent constitution, vigour and quality. Every colour had a grouping of birds that suitably represented the variety and more importantly the breed. For this standard the breeders deserve hearty congratulations.

In closing I must thank the Club for the invitation to judge and my stewards on the day Trevor Dent and Sonya Ford.

Judges Report Qld State Show 2019

It was a pleasure to be asked to judge the Orpingtons at the QLD state show held at Toowoomba.

Unfortunately I did not get to judge the Orpington Bantams, but I would like to say that there were tremendous line up of bantams. The buffs and blues have made real headway. The Blacks had some terrific fowls, females and males showing terrific underline. What was also pleasing to see was that there were bantams there that showed type that were not too big. I am afraid some of winning our bantams are getting to large. I heard a leading judge make excuse for this at a recent show I attended were he stated the feathering had to be abundant, so to get that the bantam has to be big. Well know where in the standard can I find the word "abundant" the standard actual says under Plumage Fairly profuse, soft and close, but not loose and fluffy. There were many bantams shown at this show that had fairly profuse feathering whilst still being bantams.. Well done to the Qld breeders.

The large fowl that I judged were a solid lot. The Champion Orpington of Show was a large Black Cock bird exhibited by Karen Bussian. Won easily had a lot going for him. HIs stable mate was another good cock bird. The rest of the blacks were fair. The buffs were the biggest class plenty of good colour and scale. Many of the males needed better fronts and unfortunately the asiatic eye brow is creeping in from the import blood. It was interesting I judged a large line up of buff cochins the same day and the heads of some of the buff Orpingtons were alarming similar to that of the cochins. Attractive but not too standard. The other problem with the buffs is the feet. I hear calls that the large buffs should be beating the blacks more, alas this can't happen until we get the feet on the buff breeders they are magnificent. A few blues a couple with very nice type. Alas I fear we need to do some more work with the colour. The whites for me were an exciting class. The best presented white Orpingtons I have seen and had the pleasure to judge was the highlight of my day. Vicki Owen you are a master of presentation as a white fowl. The cockerel of Vicki's I put up had his problems namely lack of size but his presentation as a white fowl made him unbeatable on the day. A good big female in the white class could have gone further but was not presented well.

Thankyou to the Qld members for the invitation to judge your show, it is always a pleasure to judge in QLD.
